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### COLD WAR ENDGAME

Report of a Conference Sponsored by the John Foster Dulles Program for the Study of Leadership in International Affairs, Princeton University, and the James A. Baker III Institute for Public Policy, Rice University

In March 1996, the Woodrow Wilson School and the James A. Baker III Institute for Public Policy convened a group of key former Soviet and American officials who had been counterparts in the final period of the cold war. The conference offered them the opportunity to discuss how they managed the tumultuous diplomacy during the three years from the accession of President George Bush in January 1989 to the collapse of the Soviet Union in December 1991. Discussions covered the "pause" in relations with the Soviets declared by President Bush in February 1989, the collapse of Communism in Europe in the fall of that year, the new relationship that developed between Bush and Gorbachev at the Malta summit in December, the genesis and management of the "two-plus-four" talks on Germany in early 1990, collaboration between the superpowers against Iraq's occupation of Kuwait, and the dramatic domestic developments in the Soviet Union that culminated in the August 1991 coup and the collapse of the Soviet state four months later.

The former American officials participating in the conference and their official positions in the period under discussion were Secretary of State James A. Baker III; National Security Adviser General Brent Scowcroft; Counselor of the State Department Robert Zoellick; Ambassador to the Soviet Union Jack E. Matlock Jr.; and National Security Council staff member Philip Zelikow. The former Soviet participants were Foreign Minister Alexandr Bessmertnykh; Anatoly S. Chernyaev, personal adviser on foreign affairs to General Secretary and President Mikhail Gorbachev; Sergei Tarasenko, principal foreign policy assistant to Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze; and Pavel Palazchenko, special assistant and interpreter to President Gorbachev.

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
