Cover photograph: The critically Endangered Bengal Florican *Houbaropsis bengalensis* has two disjunct populations, one in the Indian Subcontinent, the other in South-East Asia. The population is very small and is rapidly declining, largely as a result of the widespread and on-going conversion of its grassland habitat for agriculture. Here Packman *et al.* report on a survey conducted between March and May 2012 on and surrounding the Tonle Sap floodplain in Cambodia, which supports the last extant breeding population of the Indochinese subspecies *blandini*.
