A new approach to the economic history of the United States, this study has consolidated theory, statistics, and history. The study, in this manner, provides an analytical framework for examining economic growth with specific application to the United States, and broader implications for the study of economic growth in general. This framework allows for the development of important new statistical data which are used to test hypotheses developed in this book. The most important of these new data are the export and import price indices for the United States during the period 1790–1860 and resultant estimates of the terms of trade. The major theme throughout this study is the way in which American foreign trade and shipping influenced the growth of the economy and, in particular, the pivotal role of cotton export trade in inducing both the pace of the westward movement and the growth of manufacturing in the Northeast.
