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Cover illustration: Title page of the popular science monthly *Koralle*, issue n° 7, published in late October 1926 by Ullstein Press in Berlin. The artist’s rendering of “the biggest observatory of the world” relates to the issue’s lead article by E. Finlay Freundlich on Mount Wilson Observatory discussing its 100-inch Hooker telescope built in 1917. However, the image on the cover pictures the telescope of the public Berlin Archenhold Observatory with its giant telescope of 1896, then the biggest in the world, with a focal length of 21 meters.

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
