## Editorial Foreword

CSSH articles fall into series, each new contributor to a series handling its subject in a different context or from a different point of view. The following notes are for the convenience of readers who may wish to read what has appeared in earlier issues on problems discussed in this one.

CARTOONING Afaf Marsot continues the series which includes the studies by Streicher in Vol. 8 and Vol. 9, by Coupe on the German cartoon, and by Alba on the Mexican Revolution and the cartoon in Vol. 9.

LEGAL CHANGE IN ISLAM Among a number of related articles are those by Lloyd I. and Suzanne Rudolph in Vol. 8 which explores legal cultures and social change, by Derrett on the administration of Hindu Law by the British in Vol. 4, and by Fyzee in Vol. 5, 'Muhammadan Law in India'.

CONFLICT Among articles dealing with political and structure are those by Shils in Vol. 2, by Apter in Vol. 4, by Gray in Vol. 5; a study of *Caudillo* politics by Hansen and Wolf appeared in Vol. 9.

Tilly and Shorter approach problems of social unrest in industrial society, exploring them for the French case over an unusually long space of time with quantitative data and methodological interest. See also Wolfram Fischer's article on 'Social Tensions at Early Stages of Industrialization' (IX: 1).

The articles on revolution are summarized in the Editorial Foreword in Vol. 12, No. 2, where José Moreno's study of Che Guevara also appeared. Leo Kuper here introduces the ethnic factor into the discussion.

EDUCATION Robert R. Palmer here compares higher education in England, France, and Germany. An earlier article was Jansen and Stone's on education and modernization in Japan and England in Vol. 9.
