Kate and Ellen Bateman were six and four years old when they premiered as Richmond and Richard III, respectively, in 1849, their first production as stars. The sisters rarely performed whole plays; instead, they filled two hours of performance with scenes from several works. The Batemans' repertoire included, in addition to King Richard III, Macbeth, The Merchant of Venice, and the nineteenth-century comedy Paul Pry. Child prodigies were as popular in the nineteenth century as they are today. Their working conditions were also a matter of public concern; eventually, by the end of the nineteenth century, the first U.S. legislation regarding the working conditions of child actors was passed.
