In 1823, playwright James Robinson Planché persuaded actor Charles Kemble to present *King John* in historically accurate costume, beginning a series of meticulously researched productions of Shakespeare's works. This costume design for Mistress Quickly comes from Planché's *Costume of Shakespeare's plays, 1823-1825*, which catalogued the costumes from several of those productions, including *The First Part of Henry IV, As You Like It,* and *Othello*. Planché applied a similar approach to the non-Shakespearen historical plays he worked on throughout the late 1820s and 1830s; his advocacy for historical realism increased this kind of representation in London's theatre districts in the mid 19th century. Planché was also a prolific playwright, penning around 180 theatrical pieces of great variety, including masques, high dramas, and grand operas. (Roy, Donald.
