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case comments and does not publish articles that are restricted to narrow controversies or to discussions of legal rules or doctrines local to a single jurisdiction, including Canada. The exceptions are short pieces that we call "Discussions" or "Essays." These are papers that are especially interesting philosophically, perhaps in the light of important legal events past or present. Similarly, while the *CJLJ* is not a history journal, historical discussions relevant to philosophy and law are welcomed as studies in the history of ideas.
