



CALL FOR SPECIAL ISSUE PROPOSALS

(For the 2026 special issue)

Due December 6, 2024

The Editorial Board of the *Canadian Journal of Law and Society / Revue Canadienne Droit et Société* is seeking proposals for the 2026 special issue of the journal (Volume 41, Issue 2 or Issue 3). The annual thematic special issue, curated by guest editors, will be selected by the Editorial Board during the winter 2025.

Each special issue explores a theme across a range of genres through contributions from a diverse group of scholars. The CJLS/RCDS is an interdisciplinary, peer-reviewed journal that publishes cutting-edge research on law and its social and cultural contexts. Proposals should include both French and English contributions.

Since January 2023, all issues of the journal have been fully open access and all articles are published with a non-exclusive Gold Open Access CC-BY licence (see [here](#) for more details). This means that all authors can now publish their articles open access without paying any fees. See this [FAQ](#) for more information.

Past Special Issues have included:

- 2025 – Contemporary Changes in the World of Work: What Are the Challenges for Labour Regulation?
- 2024 – Person-Centred Justice: Reimagining Law, Institutions and Process
- 2023 – Pandemics and Paradigms of Governance: Futures of the Rule of Law in the 21st Century

Proposals by potential guest editors must comply with the CJLS/RCDS [Submission](#) guidelines for all authors interested in submitting manuscripts to the journal.
