INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this guide is to support you, as teachers and administrators, as you transition to using *EVOLVE DIGITAL* in your institution.

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WHAT IS *EVOLVE DIGITAL*?

EVOLVE DIGITAL is a six-level online general English course which takes students from A1 to C1 level.

It offers full flexibility to any institution looking to deliver its English program with digital materials.

It can be used 100% online with no synchronous classes, or the online work can be supplemented with one or more synchronous classes per unit with a teacher.

Student's Course

Teacher's Companion (including Online Tests)



STUDENT'S COURSE

The Student's Course consists of interactive instructional, practice, and production activities for asynchronous learning. The core course content can be accessed on any device and students and teachers can easily view students' progress through the course.

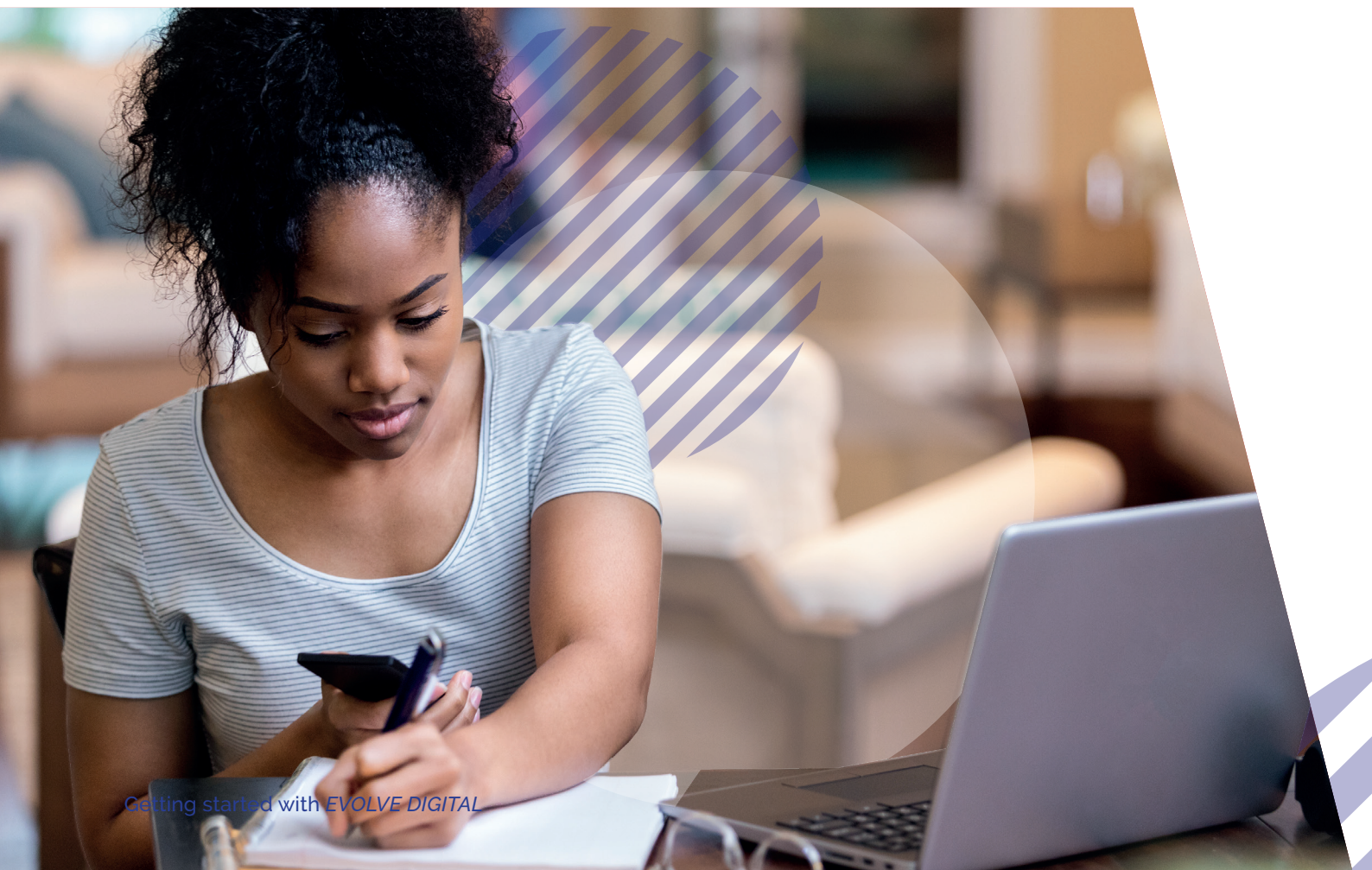
Each level of *EVOLVE DIGITAL* has 12 units, and each unit has 5 core lessons and 1 or 2 optional video lessons.

4 Student's Course unit structure

The 5 lessons for asynchronous study are:

- ▶ Lesson 1: Grammar and Vocabulary (1)
- ▶ Lesson 2: Grammar and Vocabulary (2)
- ▶ Lesson 3: Functional language
- ▶ Lesson 4: Skills – listening, reading, writing
- ▶ Unit review

In addition each unit has 1 or 2 optional video lessons called *Time to watch*, a grammar game and a vocabulary game.



Lessons 1 & 2

Unit introduction

Students watch a short, engaging video presented by a real English language teacher to introduce them to the aims of the unit. They then complete some short warmer activities to get them thinking about the topics within the unit.

Vocabulary presentations

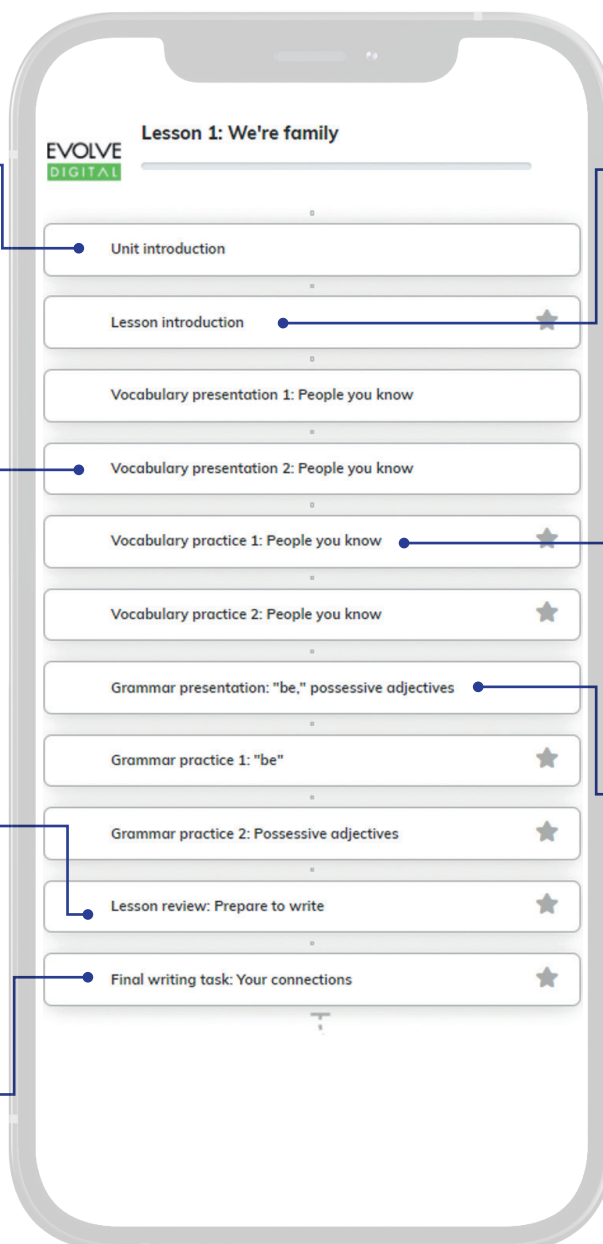
Students read and hear the target language both on its own and modelled in a sentence. There's also an illustrative picture and a definition adapted from the Cambridge Dictionary. The vocabulary set is divided into two and interspersed with simple, low-stakes comprehension checks to support learning.

Productive vocabulary practice

Students have the opportunity to practice, produce, and consolidate the new vocabulary.

Lesson review and productive task

The final stage of the lesson brings it all together. Students practice the grammar and vocabulary together in a series of productive activities before preparing a short, personalized written or spoken task to send to their teacher.



Lesson introduction

In this activity, students read the lesson objectives and then either watch videos featuring English students (at the lower levels) or proficient English language speakers (for levels 5 and 6), or read short and engaging texts to contextualize the grammar and vocabulary they're going to encounter.

Receptive vocabulary practice

Students encounter the words they've just learned again in a fresh context and do some receptive practice activities.

Grammar presentation

The next two stages practice students' receptive understanding of the grammar with activities such as sentence completion, multiple choice, listening comprehension. They are then asked to manipulate the grammar with productive activities such as text entry and word ordering tasks.

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Lesson 3

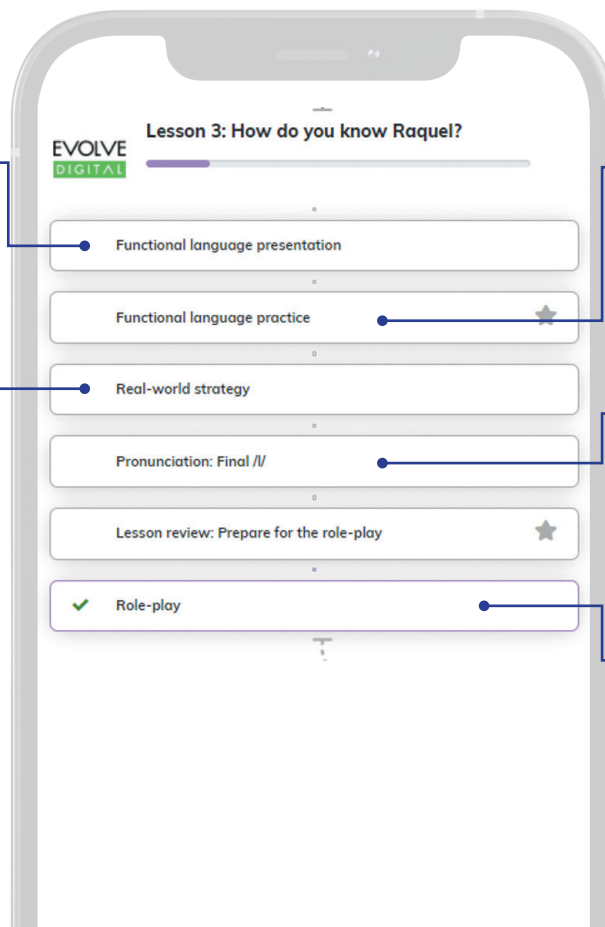
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Functional language presentation

The expressions are presented and contextualized through a series of engaging receptive activities.

Real-world strategy

The functional language strand is complemented by a short activity which presents and practices a useful speaking strategy. Students complete a range of receptive and productive activities to contextualize and practice the real-world strategy.



Functional language practice

Students practice the expressions they learned in the first activity, encountering and manipulating the new language across a range of contexts.

Pronunciation for speaking

Students learn about a pronunciation feature of spoken English and learn to produce it themselves, with a focus on comprehensibility.

Lesson review and final role-play

The final stage of the lesson combines the functional language, real-world strategy, and pronunciation focus in a series of activities, culminating in a role-play conversation which makes use of innovative speech recognition technology.

Lesson 4

Reading or listening skills presentation

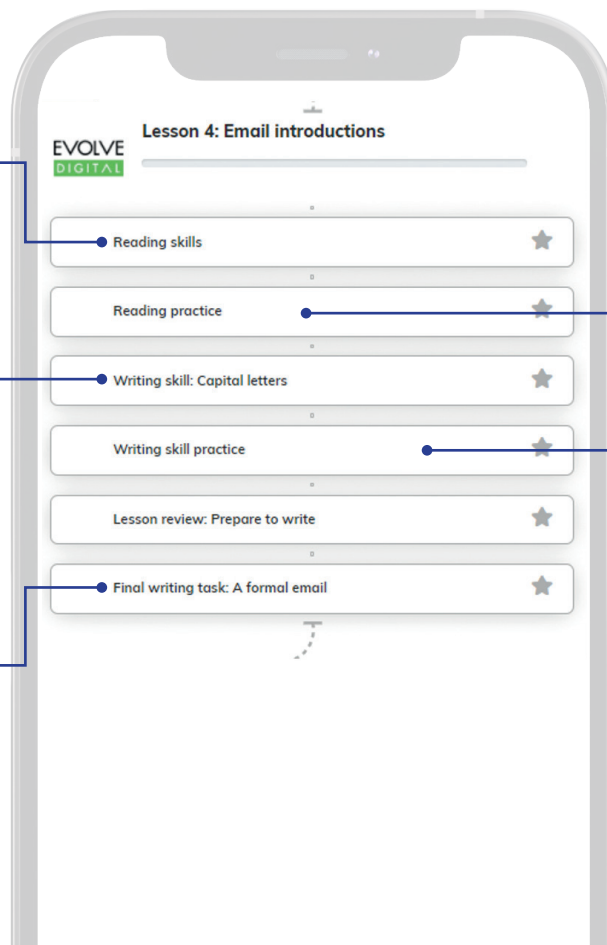
Students answer questions about a reading or listening text to develop specific skills, e.g., reading for gist or listening for detail.

Writing skills presentation

Specific writing skills, e.g., using paragraphs or linking words, are presented and contextualized in a short text.

Lesson review and final writing task

These screens provide scaffolding and support as students prepare, plan, and write their own text, e.g., an email or a personal statement.



Skills practice

Students do more practice of these skills, often with a secondary text.

Writing skills practice

Students practice these writing skills through a mix of discrete tasks and analysis of a model answer in preparation for the final writing task.

Unit review

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Vocabulary review

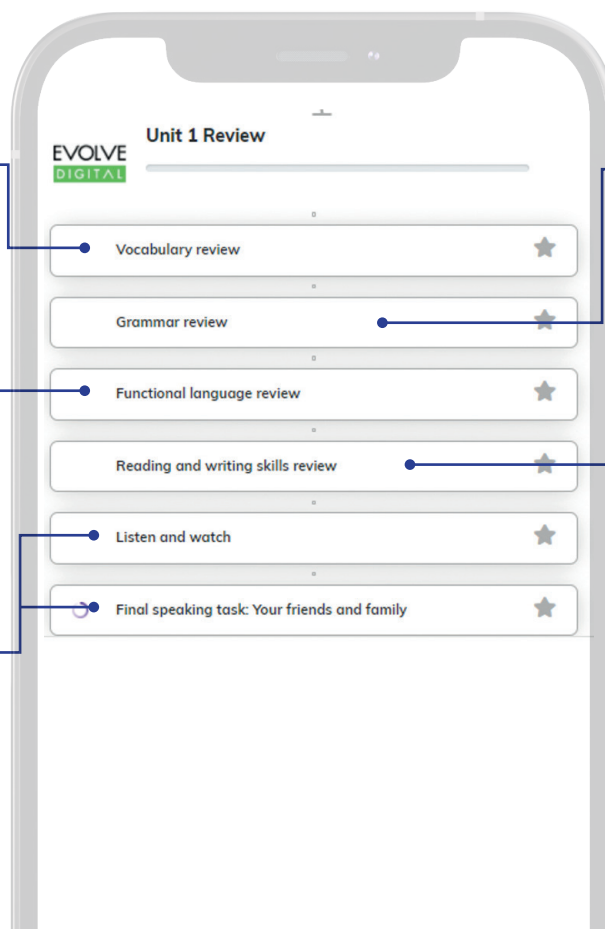
Students review the vocabulary from Lessons 1 and 2.

Functional language review

Students review the functional language and real-world strategy from Lesson 3.

Listen and watch and final speaking task

Students watch a series of authentic people-on-the-street videos filmed in New York. They then prepare and record a presentation on a similar theme.



Grammar review

Students review the grammar from Lessons 1 and 2.

Skills review

Students review the reading/listening skills and writing skill from Lessons 4.



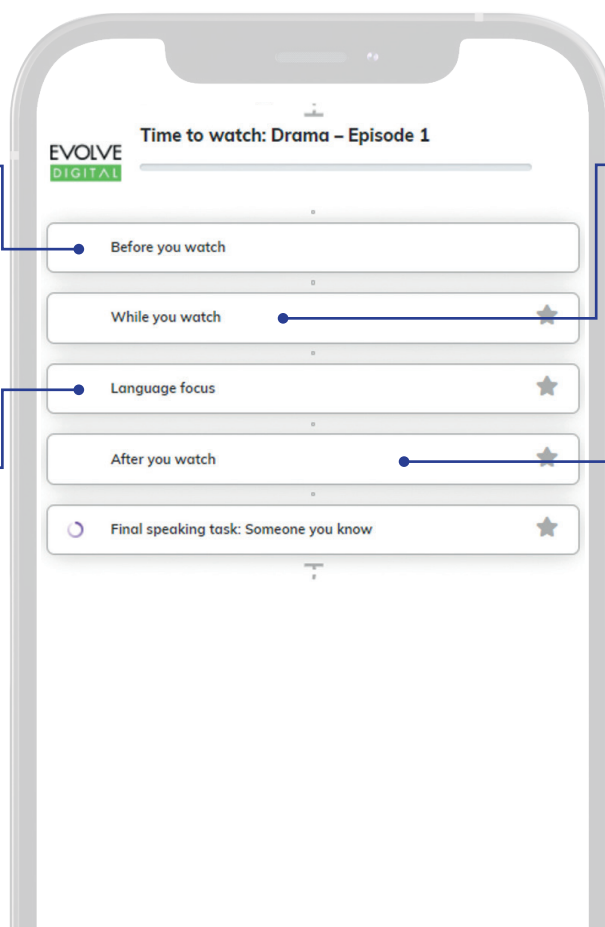
Time to watch – Optional video lessons*

Before you watch

Students work through a series of activities to activate prior knowledge about the topic of the mini-documentary/drama video. They also learn key vocabulary and predict the content of the video they'll watch.

Language focus

This stage of the lesson focuses on revisiting target language from the unit that students encountered in the video.



While you watch

Students watch the mini-documentary/drama video and complete various comprehension activities.

After you watch and final speaking task

The final stage of the video lesson sees students responding to the video through further comprehension checks and opportunities for personalization. Students then record themselves answering a question or giving a presentation and send it to their teacher.

*Note: There are one or two video lessons per unit – one based on a mini-documentary and one based on a drama video. The video offering differs between levels of the course to give learners greater variety of input.

TEACHER'S COMPANION

The Teacher's Companion offers ready-made synchronous lessons which consist of PowerPoint presentations with teacher's notes, embedded audio, and associated materials (worksheets) for use by students. These synchronous lessons are focused on providing speaking and skills practice in a safe speaking environment, with the teacher providing motivation to students, and the students receiving feedback on their communicative work.

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Each unit has the following five synchronous lessons:

- ▶ Lesson 1: Grammar and Vocabulary (1)
- ▶ Lesson 2: Grammar and Vocabulary (2)
- ▶ Lesson 3: Functional language
- ▶ Lesson 4: Skills: listening, reading, speaking
- ▶ Lesson 5: Topic-based free speaking activity

Because these ready-made lessons are in PowerPoint form, they can be mixed and matched, or supplemented with content from the teacher, so every teacher can create their own perfect synchronous lessons to exactly match the objectives of their program.



ONLINE TESTS

Teachers with access to the Teacher's Companion can also assign online tests to their students.

Unit Progress Tests

Available for every unit of *EVOLVE DIGITAL*, these tests can be used to evaluate students' strengths and weaknesses with respect to the unit's key learning objectives. There is one test per unit which covers grammar, vocabulary, reading and listening. All the tests are automatically graded. Students are offered tips for how to address areas where they are getting a low score, and can then take the test a second time.

Mid-term and Final Tests

There are three tests per level (after units 1-6, units 7-12 and units 1-12). These tests are designed to be taken once and can be used to assess student's achievement of the course's key learning objectives. Each test is made up of a main test (covering grammar, vocabulary, reading and listening) and separate writing and speaking papers. All the tests, except for the speaking paper, are automatically graded.

Please note: students cannot access tests until they are assigned by a teacher or administrator, and it is recommended that the tests are taken on a desktop or laptop.

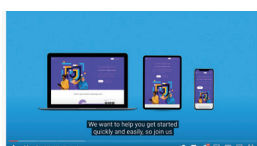

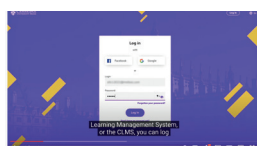

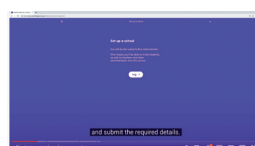
