To focus on this wave of civic engagement education, APSA is publishing the ebook *Teaching Civic Engagement Across the Disciplines*, edited by Elizabeth C. Matto, Rutgers University; Alison Rios Millett McCartney, Towson University; Elizabeth A. Bennion, Indiana University; and Dick Simpson, University of Illinois at Chicago.

The book redirects the focus from teaching better political science courses to teaching civic engagement across the disciplines. This movement involves university-wide coordinated civic engagement programs and action plans as well as a new nation-wide action plan across high schools, community colleges, four-year colleges, and research universities to consolidate the gains that have been made and provide the resources for the next leap forward. Building on the 2013 book *Teaching Civic Engagement: From Student to Active Citizen*, this book advances the conversation on civic engagement and provides critical scholarly insight into where to go next.
